Cycling & Re-Cycling

found an old cream carton in my fridge this morning, there are distinctly unwholesome, hard remains in the bottom. Shall I clean it out and put it in the green bin or just chuck it in the black bin? I irritably clean it out, fuming about the nuisance and wondering about domesticity.

When I was a child clothes were washed by hand in tepid water with soap flakes and hard, yellow soap. Then washing machines, vacuum cleaners and the rest 'liberated ' us from domestic chores. Now, machines use energy so we must use them sparingly and we must find time to clean and sort the rubbish. Strange how progress cycles round and round.

Sorting rubbish is worthwhile but only if it is properly managed at the waste disposal site. Workers at the sites have a hard job sorting out all the yuk that is put into the wrong bin but then what? We know that glass, paper and some plastic can be re-used but what about the rest?

There is a proposal to build an incinerator – a massive incinerator – maybe at Blakenham. It would be

designed to burn residual rubbish from all over Suffolk and possibly to also take rubbish from Essex or London. This might generate money for Suffolk but do we want London's rubbish?

Incinerators produce smoke full of toxic substances and lorries carrying rubbish over long distances use fuel and generate carbon. There are other, more environmentally friendly ways of dealing with rubbish. Kitchen waste can be composted and other rubbish can be burned in enclosed units, a bit like an autoclave or pressure cooker.

There is a lot to think about and to learn; the cheapest short term solution may not be the best, or cheapest, answer in the long term.

Then there is my bicycle; I enjoyed cycling as a child, it gave me a splendid freedom. Later, living in Cambridge, it was the only practical form of transport. Now, I'm old and cycling seems like hard work, especially wobbling along with loads of shopping. I would much rather walk with a ruck sack, anyway, my bike has a puncture. *Evelyn Adey*

Information on board...

he Rural Coffee Caravan Information Project does exactly what it says on the box – or rather the caravan – it brings coffee, tea, home-made cakes and information to Suffolk's villages.

And later this year it will be making its first appearance in Redlingfield (see what's on pages).

But it is much more than just a mobile coffee morning. If the volunteers don't have the information you require, or the solution to your problem, they will try to find it and

point you in the right direction. And while they don't act as a counselling service an area of the caravan is available for private talks. Of course, not everyone is in search of information or

advice. If you have just moved into the area, you might like to meet your neighbours. Even if you've lived here a while, there may be new people you haven't had the chance to meet. This could be your chance.

If the event is a success a regular timetable of visits to Redlingfield could be established .

The Rural Coffee Caravan Information Project – launched in 2003 – deals with a wide range of requests for information and help on issues ranging from planning and pensions to childcare and crime. It is also successful as a point of social contact – a 'parish pump' – where residents can pass the time of day with neighbours, sometimes even making new friends.

On board the Caravan there are a wide variety of leaflets and information.

other rural businesses; SAVO – Suffolk Association of Voluntary Organisations; Shaw Trust – a charity which works to help people with disabilities find employment; Suffolk ACRE – a charity and company which works with communities to tackle the economic, social and environmental needs; Suffolk County Council services; and Suffolk Primary Care Trusts.

The project – run by volunteers – makes no charge for the service – all they suggest is that visitors may like to make a small donation.

Taming the Tiger with Horham Baptist Church

HORHAM Baptist Church is joining with other churches in the area to invite three times world Kung Fu Champion Tony Anthony to tell you about his life at Athelington Hall on Saturday, April 26. Tony was sent to China aged four to be trained by his grandfather as a Kung Fu grandmaster. After being beaten daily for years he was rebuilt as the ultimate fighting machine.

After a personal tragedy his life spiralled out of control. Becoming a body guard for some of the richest people in the world, he ended up chasing people for debts, beating and sometimes killing them for fun. In a Cypriot jail his life was dramatically changed by a visit from someone who wanted to help him. His book telling of his life, *Taming The Tiger* was the Christian Booksellers Convention book of the year in 2005.

As well as Tony telling his story former Zimbabwe cricketer Henry Olonga – the fast bowler famous for his stand in the 2003 World Cup where he wore a black arm band to mourn the loss of democracy in his country – will be singing.

The evening will be in the 600-seater marquee on the grounds of Athelington Hall and starts at 7.30pm. The doors open at 6.45pm and there will be a licensed bar. Admission is free on the night.

You have the chance to record our history

The history of any village is tied up with the historical events which have shaped our cultural and national identity. Suffolk is a rural county which developed its wealth and trade, based on agriculture.

What gives a particular place its character is, to a great degree defined by the geography of the land and the natural materials at hand. When settlements were beginning to be developed and the land deforested, ready for crops and domesticated animals, the hunter gatherer life which our ancestors had pursued was coming to an end and an accumulated community knowledge was being eroded. This has happened repeatedly throughout history and much knowledge has been lost, as it still is to this day.

Some of the earliest records relating to our villages come from the Domesday Survey of 1086. This, in a fragmented way, gives us an idea of who was in control of the land, which crops were grown and how many types of animal were being bred. Property was also listed – such as the manor house, church or monastic foundation and the site of the mill – most probably watermills as windmill technology came later. Everything was valued and accounted for as scribes and clerics gathered this information for the Crown.

To find out about a particular place we usually go to the parish church as this is, in most cases, the oldest surviving architectural structure and repository for information relating to our ancestors – when they were born, who they married and when they died. If we are very lucky we can find a gravestone, memorial or written record. With the census details for civil registration starting in 1841 we

can find out more about our origins and family

connections.

We also need pictures

of the architecture of particular places and people. This has been made much easier thanks to the camera, but pen and paper is much more fun. Buildings have been lost to us, many have changed out of all recognition and others, sadly, should not have been built at all.

In our own families and within our groups and wider communities we have a wealth of accumulated knowledge which can be recorded visually and verbally. Such knowledge and information should be passed on through our families, friends and within our own communities. This can be a written record, a diary of events, or from newspaper cuttings, sale particulars or photographs.

We each have the opportunity to add something to the history of our villages, orally, visually or as a written statement; as we are all storehouses of knowledge about our families, friends, villages, homes, past events and the environment around us.

A lot needs to be done if you wish to make a historical record about your village and village life, for future generations to learn about and enjoy.

They say that a picture is worth a thousand words so I have included one for good measure. I am happy to collate material, photograph family pictures and collect material on Athelington, Horham and Redlingfield and encourage you to contribute to your magazine as Margaret Cossey did with the villagers of Athelington and Horham for the *Horham Tatler*, published in 1892 and 1893.

Planting woods is lesson in patience

It may well be that the hardest lesson to be learnt when you plant a woodland is patience. As we look at our community woodland we are inordinately proud of the task accomplished so far, but now we must sit on our hands and wait for nature to do her bit.

The trees in Pound Lane Wood, Horham, are planted, many of them grown from seeds that we collected ourselves; the pond is flourishing, and the wildflower meadow already showing signs of colour, and the wood is a favourite venue for local dog walkers, so the challenge that we set ourselves has so far been successful, but what of the future?

The young trees will still need mulching, the rides must be cut and the hedges kept under control, but the most pressing need now is to maintain your interest, as this is a project which will not reach maturity until many of the local children involved in its planting are themselves mature adults. We take comfort as we look at Brakey Wood in Hoxne where, since the millennium, the trees have grown to a significant size, and hope that we achieve the same success at Pound Lane.

Planning - The parish council have received a number of planning applications via Mid Suffolk District Council including outline planning for building plots, goat-rearing accommodation to the right of Thorpe Hall lane on the Stradbroke Road and additional holiday lodges at Athelington Hall.

District Councillor Elizabeth Gibson-Harries reports - Positive moves are afoot to develop the Hartismere Hospital site in Eye to become a state-of-the-art medical facility. The old building will be sold off for housing and new facilities are to be built for respite care. There will also be maternity and treatment units.

Traffic Speeding - Little progress has been made towards equipping volunteers with hand-held speed cameras for obtaining evidence to help the police in the crackdown on speeding through Horham village. Councillor John Bloomfield has been pursuing the matter with some urgency.

Fitting tribute to brave young men

he Red Feather Club was originally the Non Commissioned Officers

(NCO) club from June 1943 until 1945. The name comes from the 95th Bomb Group emblem, which has the red feather on the shield.

Young air and ground crews used the club to relax when not on duty. Food and beer was served, there were dances and music – the Group even had its own band, and murals decorated the walls.

When the Americans returned home after the war the buildings were bought by local farmer Mr Mager who used them to rear rabbits and chickens, and to house farm machinery, gradually they fell into disrepair and the corrugated sheets on the roofs rusted.

In 1981 a local group of enthusiasts called the 'Friends of the 95th' bought the buildings from Mr Mager and raised money to reroof and insulate the room which houses the famous murals painted by one of the airmen. The murals were in incredibly good condition considering they had been exposed to the elements.

In 1981, American veterans returned to their old base at Horham and visited the buildings and saw the murals. Some also returned in 1988, 1992, and 1994 and it was thought that after this time with the Americans reaching their mid 70s that there would be fewer visitors.

The site was kept tidy by a small team of volunteers and a few of the veterans families visited, until in 2000 Suffolk County Council had an initiative to publicise the county's airfields and priories called 'Friars to Flyers'.



A new group was formed called Horham Airfield Heritage Association, which had their first open day in October 2000. The group had support from the local council to publicise the former airfield to tourists and The Red Feather become a visitor attraction.

In 2003 after many fund raising events such as film shows, talks and open days it was suggested by Susan Brooks, the 'Flyers to Friars' project leader, that the association apply for a Local Lottery Heritage Initiative Grant to restore the buildings. The 'Friends of the 95th' (the owners of the site) and Horham Airfield Heritage Association merged to become the 95th Bomb Group Heritage Association, which applied for and was awarded a grant.

All the restoration work has been completed by voluntary local labour, with the grant purchasing building materials, specialised workers such as electricians and signs to direct visitors

to the site and inform them about the buildings. The restoration has been done to

ensure originality as much as possible but also uses modern materials.

The group has held many successful open days and other events and with central heating being installed we can hold events in the winter months to restore the social element to the buildings.

At the 2004 and 2005 open days American veterans and their families returned, and they were moved to have a memorial site to the 95th Bomb Group and a museum to house archives and artefacts and a roll of honour to the 617 brave young men who lost their lives whilst stationed at Horham.
